BIG PICTURE

What is an Entrepreneur?

Anyone can be entrepreneurial: employees, owners, assistants, and even entire businesses. Being an entrepreneur is about cultivating a thought process that involves pushing the boundaries of discovery, problem-solving and creative thinking.

Why Do We Need Entrepreneurs?

Entrepreneurs bring new ideas and initiate fresh patterns where momentum is needed or lacking. This momentum brings opportunity for economic growth, community change, and radical generosity. Entrepreneurs test their faith when they take risks while helping others believe that they can chase God's calling in their own lives too. Entrepreneurship, when properly implemented, attracts others to join in on something that is bigger than themselves. This becomes *business-as-a-mission* when done well, opening the door to meaningful and eternal conversations that will have impact beyond this life.
